



I'd like to begin by thanking you for your support in the last election. All councillors from the Primeau team were elected. It was a great night for us. Participation was strong for a municipal election

and that's great for democracy!

TEAM PRIMEAU

The reality of election teams was discussed at the time. I even gave an interview about it on Radio-Canada. Candidates from many municipalities chose that option in 2017. For my part, the main reason was to make voting easier. With the name of the team on the ballot, it made it easier for those electors who supported us. Obviously the question of free will was discussed. Were these elected officials going to blindly follow my policies? No... That I can assure you. Free will is a priority in our working group. I believed that it was more transparent and honest to have a declared team than an ambiguous alliance. It's not the first time that a team is up for election here and it has never dulled the independence of its individual members.

A REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL

I believe that the force of a group is its diversity. It's important for me to have people who can bring constructive arguments, take on files, be fair and have a vision for our municipality. Council must represent citizens' interests and priorities. The Canton de Hatley population is diverse and I think it's important that citizens identify with Council.

A BREATH OF FRESH AIR

Unfortunately, political change also means losing people. Despite excellent work over the last 14 years from outgoing candidates that were defeated, I felt like I had to make difficult decisions to reach these objectives. The addition of two candidates with diverse interests and competencies will bring a breath of fresh air and renewed energy. Supported by experienced council members and a solid administrative staff, they will have the support they need to learn the ropes of municipal administration. I welcome them and hope they find the experience rewarding.

During the election campaign many questions were raised by our adversaries but also by electors like you. Even if most issues have already been discussed in previous publications, I believe it would be a good time to return to some.

MASSAWIPPI BEACH

Massawippi beach in Ayer's Cliff was often discussed during my campaigning. The goal was to ensure public access to Lake Massawippi, especially for families of today and tomorrow. As in many areas, natural treasures are being privatized which reduces access for future generations. This acquisition was done through the inter-municipal agency of the Parc régional Massawippi, made up of the municipalities bordering the lake. More specifically, it is a coownership between Ayer's Cliff, Hatley, North Hatley and Sainte-Catherine-de-Hatley.

WORD OF THE MAYOR (cont'd)

I can assure you that this acquisition is largely supported. It was a visionary decision from municipal councils who accepted, by resolution, the project brought forward by the Parc régional Massawippi agency.

It's important that we deal with current files but even more so, we must be concerned with the future Canton de Hatley residents.

In numbers:

- \$340 000 per municipality, North Hatley not participating but remaining open to a partnership with the Ayer's Cliff beach. Of the five shares, Ayer's Cliff owns two and the other members; Hatley, Canton de Hatley, Ste-Catherine-de-Hatey, one each.
- Beach bought for \$1,5M, but valued at \$2,25M
- Marina has a 2 year lease at \$10 000/ year
- \$9 per property for 40 years. Capital and interest.

Mount Orford

In the same view, the municipality invested \$50 000 over 5 years through the regional government to revive Mount Orford. Each municipality invested according to its property wealth. It was important for the MRC Memphremagog mayors' council to stimulate the regional economy and Mount Orford is an important actor in that respect. It's part of

the region's identity and an important part of the tourism economy in our region.

Region fire protection agency

Newly created, the Régie intermunicipale de prévention et de protection incendie Memphrémagog Est is a project I've been heading for many years. It came to fruition last September when it was accepted by the eight municipalities. The objective is to have a regional direction. For this project to succeed, hiring a director is essential. The mandate will be to consolidate procurement, optimize equipment and human resources and see improved services to citizens.

In the area of fire protection and public security, government requirements and residents expectations are constantly evolving. We need a more efficient structure to respond to this new reality. Over the last years, many such agencies have been created in Québec. The vast majority have been successful. We must consider that the Public security minister and the Quebec association of fire chiefs are favorable to and encourage such unification efforts.

All things being equal, when calculating the cost distribution according to established criteria, it is a fact that Canton de Hatley will see a \$65 000 increase over 4 years. The increase might seem steep but we must take the following details into account.

- Each year, Sainte-Catherine-de-Hatley contributes \$85 000 to the fire protection agency of Canton de Hatley and North Hatley to cover one of its sectors. Sainte-Catherine-de-Hatley intends to have its own fire service. The land is acquired and the funds are set aside. When that goes into operation we will lose that \$85 000. Moreover, we will probably lose some firemen. So there will be training costs when we find people interested in taking these posts.
- The northern part of the municipality, such as Haskell Hill, is covered by the city of Sherbrooke. It costs \$45 000 per year. In 2018-2019, there will be a new fire station on Collège Street about ten minutes away. It is likely that Sherbrooke, with an improved service, will want to increase the bill. The costs of such agreements will be covered by the new agency, the Régie de l'Est.
- We can't disregard the optimization of procurement. Planning and unification will improve procurement costs.

And no, I am not interested in becoming the director of the new agency.

Finally, I would like to remind everyone that my door is always open. If you have concerns or questions, it will be my pleasure to meet with you.

FOLLOW-UP ON COUNCIL MEETINGS

SEPTEMBER 11TH 2017 COUNCIL MEETING

1) By-law concerning the construction of accesses to public roads

The municipality adopts by-law 2017-11 concerning the construction of accesses to the public roads.

2) Paving of Haskell Hill road and Chaumière Street

The municipality adopts by-law 2017-02 concerning the pavement of Haskell Hill road and Chaumière Street.

3) Compensation of electoral personnel

The municipality adopted by-law 2017-13 concerning the compensation of electoral personnel.

4) Subsidy for local roads

The Quebec Transport ministry gives a 8 167 \$ subsidy over 3 years for the improvement of certain roads.

5) Acoustic treatment for the council hall

The municipality accepts a service offer from Audiobec in the amount of \$11 178 for the acoustical treatment of the council hall.

6) Acquisition of a piano and subsidy

The municipality accepts a quote form Piano Bloui for a piano at \$5 867 tax included. The municipality received a \$2 500 subsidy from the Programme de soutien financier aux initiatives culturelles de la MRC de Memphrémagog.

7) Organisationnel structure mandate

The municipality mandates Brio human resources to study the organisational structure and personnel job descriptions.

8) Sub-categories for nonresidential properties

The municipality confirms its intention to establish sub-categories for nonresidential properties.

9) Creation of a fire protection board

Council approves a new intermunicipal agreement to create the Régie intermunicipale de prévention et de protection incendie Memphrémagog Est.

10) Mandate for Aquatech

The municipality accepts a quote from the firm Aqua Tech for the management of water analysis at the town hall.

11) Building autorisation

Council accepted the request to build at 49 Lindskou Street and 233, du Boisé Street. The by-law concerning architectural integration and implementation applies for these projects.

OCTOBER 6TH COUNCIL MEETING

1) Council adopts zoning by-law 2017-15

The municipality adopts zoning by-law 2017-17.

2) Mutual agreement for halls in case of emergency

As part of its public security planning council has signed mutual agreements with the municipalities of Sainte-Catherine-de-Hatley and Waterville. Council also authorized an agreement with the Eastern Township schoolboard for the use of the North Hatley elementary school.

3) Property categories

Council approved the following subcategories for non-residential properties: industrial and 100 % commercial (code10) categories.

4) Request from the Sherbrooke Archdiocese

The municipality informs the archdiocese that for now it does not wish to change the agricultural zoning in place and that meets the council's vision for lot 2 131 316 located at 2135 Rodgers road.

5) FQM collective insurance

The municipality adheres to the FQM collective insurance for the period beginning January 1st 2018.

6) Town Hall landscaping

The municipality accepts a quote of 49 700 \$ for landscaping the Town hall property.

7) Flashing light at the corner of Sherbrooke Road and route 143

Council asks the Transport ministry to re-install the flashing light at the corner of Sherbrooke road and route 143 for the security of drivers.

8) Harfang de l'Estrie Snowmobile Club

The municipality authorizes the Harfang de l'Estrie snowmobile club to cross certain public roads using snowmobiles.

9) Quote for granular materials and pavement

The municipality asks for quotes as part of the local road rehabilitation program for Hatley Centre and North roads. The program subsidizes 75% of the cost of materials and payement.

10) Road salt

The municipality accepts a quote for road salt from Compass Minerals in the amount of \$84,04 per ton for a quantity of 400 tons.

NOVEMBER 13TH COUNCIL MEETING

1) Seniors Friendly Municipalities program

Council mandates Mrs. Sylvie Cassar and Mr. Patrick Clowery as councillors responsible for this program. Catherine Duguay is named as representative for the financial aid request and the signature of the agreement and follow-up.

2) Infrastructure program

The municipality receives three bids:

The municipality awards the contract for granular materials and pavement to Couillard Construction on the condition of a subsidy confirmation from the infrastructure program (PIIRL).

3) Flag poles

Council accepts a quote from Tecnima for the installation of three flag poles for 4 800 \$ plus taxes, the lowest of three quotes.

4) Mandate to BrioRH

The municipality gives a mandate to BrioRH for the recruitment of a general manager, because Mrs. Breton has decided to leave her post at the end of January.

5) Organisationnel structure and job descriptions

The municipality accepts the job descriptions and organizational structure prepared by BrioRH.

6) Project submitted to road safety program

Council accepts a subsidy request to the Programme d'aide financière du fonds de la sécurité routière.

7) Delegates to the Régie incendie de l'Est

Council names Martin Primeau as delegate to the Régie intermunicipale de prévention et de protection incendie Memphrémagog Est, commonly called «Régie incendie de l'Est» as well as Mr Patrick Clowery councillor as substitute.

8) Substitute mayor

Council names Mrs. Sylvie Cassar as substitute mayor from December 2017 until August 1st, 2018.

9) Mr Michael Henri back up driver

Council accepts the nomination of Mr. Michael Henri as back up driver for snow removal.
