

TAXES AND EVALUATION

Like every year at this time, the municipal administration is preparing the tax bills. This year, there is a new assessment roll for Canton de

Hatley. Three years ago, in 2015, we decided to renew the roll. The law allows us to keep the same assessments for an extra three years. At the time, council had decided to renew the roll because we did not foresee important increases for our municipality and because it allowed us to save thousands of dollars.

For 2018, it is mandatory to establish a new roll. All residences and properties have been assessed according to the new market. It was all done by the assessment firm J.P. Cadrin et ass. through the MRC Memphrémagog. This firm is recognized throughout the province, has worked with us for years and they have my full confidence.

As you know, assessment is just a lever for taxation. The assessment rate is the source of the amount of taxes payable. A property (building and land) evaluated at \$200,000 and taxed at \$0.50 per hundred dollars costs the same as one evaluated at \$400,000 taxed at \$0.25.

The average valuation increase for properties is 9.9% over a period of six years. Residential evaluations, which concern most of us (883 units) have increased 8.6%. The highest increase is for vacant lots (359 units) with a 22.3% increase. The lowest increase, at 2.8%, is for industrial use (1 unit).

To minimize the impact on the tax bill, council has reduced the tax rate by 5%.

It goes from \$0.35 to \$0.33. So, if your property assessment has gone up 6% you will see no increase in your 2018 taxes. Since we know that the average increase is 10% (9.9%) and municipal revenue will rise by 4%. In total \$64,000.

WORD OF THE MAYOR (cont'd)

For 2018, this new revenue will be spent mostly on road work. It will be added to some savings made in 2017 to serve as a lever for different subsidies and road improvements. For the last few years we had reduced the budget for public works but still improved our roads and maintained the quality of the infrastructures. Now we must increase the budget to protect our roads and avoid important costs further down the road.

Also a part of the budget is council's decision to have address signs installed. This type of sign is now found in most rural communities in the region. We had a survey done and the vast majority of respondents were in favor. During the election campaign, many of you reminded us of this. So we are going ahead with it in 2018. The administration is working on the file to implement this decision and to keep you informed about the process. The main concern that was raised was about the color. Obviously, we will choose a sober color to minimize the visual impact but in keeping with our objective.

I'd like to remind you that I am always available if you wish to meet me to discuss different subjects or to simply share your vision of the municipality.

- The average increase of property values is 10% over a period of 6 years.

DECEMBER 4TH 2017 COUNCIL MEETING

- The second draft of by-law 2017-15 concerning zoning is adopted.
- Elected officials are nominated to different committees:

- The by-law concerning water meters is modified to include an address on Vaughan Road.
- The municipality adopts the budget for the Régie des eaux Massawippi in the amount of \$1,077,152 for 2018. The municipality's share is \$132,417. The Régie owns and manages the water treatment plant in North Hatley.
- The municipality will sign an agreement with the city of Sherbrooke for the use of fire hydrants located close the municipal limit.
- The municipality accepted BrioRH's offer to recruit a team leader for snow removal.
- The municipality hires Éric Bergeron as snow removal truck driver.
- The director deposits the council members' pecuniary interests.
- The municipality accepts the Club Quad Arc-en-ciel's request to cross some roads.
- Council names the municipal office halls:
 - Hillcrest hall (bistro)
 - Montjoye hall (Council hall)
 - Massawippi hall (Community center).

DECEMBER 20TH 2017 COUNCIL MEETING

Council adopts the budget and taxes bylaw for 2018.

JANUARY 8TH 2018 COUNCIL MEETING

- Zoning by-law 2017-15 is adopted
- By-law 2017-16 concerning water meters is adopted. The object is to include an address on Vaughan road. The object of the by-law is to account for the total consumption of the distribution system by installing

- meters where there is not already a sector meter.
- Régie intermunicipale du Parc Massawippi budget of \$162,219 is adopted for 2018. The municipality's share is \$23,324. The Parc Massawippi owns the Massawippi dam and the public beach located in Ayer's Cliff.
- Council adopts by-law the Régie incendie de l'Est budget of \$1,305,632 for 2018. The municipality's share is \$109.261.
- The municipality accepts to set aside \$58,000 of revenue from the 2017 septic tank cleaning for the 2018 income statement.
- Barnston-Ouest and Standstead-Est join the Régie de l'Est intermunicipal agreement for fire protection and prevention.
- The general manager's official resignation date was January 3,1 2018. Council accepts to prolong the contract with the same terms and conditions as the previous contract until a replacement takes up his/her duties
- Council accepts the offer from SOMUM Solutions to provide and automated call system. This tool allows the municipality to reach many citizens in a short time in case of emergency. The cost is \$3,534 before taxes with a recurring annual fee of \$723.
- The municipality mandates Mrs Annie Deshaies, assistant treasurer, to sign all SAAQ documents concerning vehicles owned by the municipality.
- Council accepts the request to build a house at 6550 Dunant.

FEBRUARY 5TH 2018 COUNCIL MEETING

- Council accepts to prolong the probation period of the new secretary-receptionist until April 11th 2018.
- Council accepts the construction request for a house at 165 rue des Méandres.
- Mrs. Sylvie Cassar is nominated as

substitute for the mayor at the MRC Menphrémagog meetings.

- Mrs. Kyanne Ste-Marie is nominated general manager starting February 6th, 2018 with a 6 month probation period.
- Council accepts a new inspection agreement with the MRC Memphrémagog.
- Mrs. Annie Deshaies is nominated as account manager for the municipality's Visa Desjardins account.
- Draft by-law 2018-02 concerning address numbers is adopted.
- The municipality adopts a policy to support elite youth in sports, culture and science.
- The municipality will present a pilot project to the Fonds de la sécurité routière to widen part of Sherbrooke road. The project represents a cost of \$50 000.
- The municipality aquires Méandres and du Plateau streets.
- The municipality proclaims February 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 as academic perseverance days.

Council adopted a draft by-law concerning address numbers. The objectives

are to improve security for citizens, to facilitate emergency services and to insure address numbers are visible from the road throughout the municipality. Installation should be done in 2018.

72 HOUR EMERGENCY KIT

It's important to have an emergency kit in your home. Make sure it contains **enough material**, food and water to meet your family's basic needs for at least the first 3 days of an emergency situation.

Keep your emergency kit in a place that is easy to access. Check its contents yearly and replace batteries and water supplies as required.

Essential Items to Keep in Your Emergency Kit

Always have the following items **in your home**. Ideally, they should be placed in a backpack or a storage bin:

• **Drinking water** — two litres per person per day, for at least 3 days;

- **Non-perishable food** enough for at least 3 days;
- Manual can opener;
- **Battery-operated radio** spare batteries;
- **Flashlight or headlamp** spare batteries, or a hand-crank flashlight or headlamp;
- · Lighter or matches and candles;
- First Aid kit antiseptic, pain medication, adhesive bandages, sterile gauze pads, scissors, etc.;
- Whistle to signal your presence to rescuers;
- Dust masks to filter contaminated air:
- Map or GPS;
- Compass;
- Sunglasses and sun lotion;
- · Pocketknife:
- Small toolbox;
- · Tent, sleeping bag and foam mat;
- Camp stove, fuel and kitchen utensils;
- Personal care items;



- Over-the-counter medications (antihistamine, ibuprofen, acetaminophen, etc.);
- Prescription medications (prescribed by your doctor);
- Garbage bags;
- Hiking shoes or boots;
- · Waterproof clothing;
- Spare clothes;
- A deck of cards, books, magazines.

The first seven items will make it possible for you and your family to survive during the first 3 days of an emergency situation, while you wait for rescue or for essential services to be reestablished.
