THE PAIR PROGRAM

Do you live alone or know someone who lives alone? The Pair program could give you the security you need. It's FREE and the program has saved many lives already! Pair is aimed primarily at people who are aging and living alone. This is a personalized, automated calling service that reaches subscribers to ensure their health is good.

How it works?

It's simple... Since the program works with computer software, the subscriber chooses the number of call (s) he wishes to receive per day or per week. He also chooses the time he receives his call (s).

When the program contacts the subscriber, responding indicates that all is well. After 3 attempts within 20 minutes, if the subscriber has not answered, the system triggers an alert and a home visit is made to verify the member's state of health.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE POLICY TO PROMOTE THE USE OF VARIOUS REUSABLE HYGIENE PRODUCTS

The Municipality of the Canton of Hatley supports families and the environment

Council wishes to encourage the residents of the Canton of Hatley to reduce their waste production for the preservation of the environment with the enhancement of its financial assistance program for the purchase of cloth diapers. Thus, a 50% refund is now offered to citizens on the purchase of certain washable and reusable hygiene products.

A reimbursement of up to \$ 200 per residence

Once the purchase is complete, each applicant must provide the supporting documents requested in order to obtain a reimbursement of up to \$ 200 maximum per residence, per year. This policy came into effect on August 2nd, 2021.

Products included in the program

The financial assistance is applicable specifically to the products indicated in the three categories below.

Categories	Products
Reusable hygiene products and services for children	 Diapers; Potty training pants made of washable and reusable fabric including pool diapers, flat diapers, diaper covers, washable inserts and liners as well as washable products for bedwetting; Material for making a set of at least 20 diapers (maximum 15 m of absorbent or waterproof fabrics. May be accompanied by accessories such as elastics, thread, snaps, etc. Accessories alone cannot be reimbursed.); Membership in a cloth diaper rental service for a minimum of 12 months; Membership in a cloth diaper washing service for a minimum of 12 months; Nursing pads.
Reusable feminine hygiene products	 Menstrual cups, washable absorbent panties, washable sanitary napkins and pantiliners that are washable, reusable and designed for use by women; Material for making a minimum of 5 sanitary napkins or washable pantiliners (maximum 5 m of absorbent or waterproof fabrics. May be accompanied by accessories such as thread, press studs, etc. Accessories alone cannot be reimbursed).
Reusable incontinence protection products	 Diapers, sanitary protection and washable, reusable absorbent underwear as well as washable products for bedwetting at night; Material for making a set of at least 10 diapers (maximum 15 m of absorbent or water-proof fabrics. May be accompanied by accessories such as elastics, thread, snaps, etc. Accessories alone cannot be reimbursed).

Add value to your fallen leaves

Dry dead leaves collected in the fall can be stored and used to line the bottom of the brown bin throughout the winter to prevent materials from sticking to the bottom of the bin. You can also use cardboard or newspaper for this purpose.

JUNE 7TH, 2021 COUNCIL MEETING

Transfer of immovable duty rates

Council adopted a by-law changing the rates on the imposition bracket that exceeds \$ 500,000, when the municipality collects a duty on the transfer of any immovable located in its territory.

- On that part of the basis of imposition that exceeds \$ 500,000 without exceeding \$ 750,000: 2%
- On that part of the basis of imposition that exceeds \$ 750,000 without exceeding \$ 1,000,000: 2.5%
- On that part of the basis of imposition base that exceeds \$ 1,000,000: 3%

The minimum rate provided for by law on the portion of the basis of any imposition bracket that exceeds \$ 264,000 is 1.5%.

Contract management regulations

The municipality adopted a by-law on contract management in accordance with Bill 67. The by-law aims to promote Quebec goods and services and suppliers, insurers and contractors who have an establishment in Quebec.

Looping of the aqueduct

In order to ensure the safety, stability and sustainability of the entire drinking water network, the municipality suggested to the Village of North Hatley the deployment of a joint investment strategy over 5 years. This strategy could include the completion of a network loop through Vaughan Road.

Rights of way for Estrie à cheval

The municipality granted rights of way on municipal land to horseback riders of the Estrie à cheval organization. The organization is responsible for maintaining the trails.

- Land constituting the continuation of Horsefall Road closed to traffic (lot 4 090 424)
- Land constituting the Eustis trail and the continuity of the Eustis road closed to traffic (lot 2 131 996)
- 352-acre municipal property crossed by the Massawippi River just south of the bike path and accessible via Kingdom Road (lot 4 029 985)
- Land constituting the Parc du Manège (lot 2 131 265)

Support for the North Hatley Library

The municipality donated \$ 500 to the North Hatley library for the year 2021.

Support for Meals on Wheels

The municipality donated \$500 to Lennoxville Community Aid and Meals on Wheels in Canton de Hatley for 2021.

Support for Bleu Massawippi

The municipality donated \$ 1,000 to support Bleu Massawippi's awareness activities.

JULY 5TH, 2021 COUNCIL MEETING

Horsefall Road Extension Request

Council denied a request to extend Horsefall Road beyond its current limit marked by the turnaround area

AUGUST 2ND, 2021 COUNCIL MEETING

Remuneration of election officials

Council adopted a by-law relating to the remuneration of staff in municipal elections. The by-law can be viewed on the municipality's website.

Access to public roads regulations

The by-law on access to public roads is amended to ensure a horizontal clearance of the culvert of 150 mm to 300 mm on the ground in relation to the lower part of the embankment.

MRC Development plan

The municipality is asking the MRC de Memphrémagog to modify the development plan project so that residential use is authorized in the trade in services zone located along highway 410 in the municipality of Canton de Hatley.

New intermunicipal agreement Landfill / Ecocentre / Composting platform

Council authorized the conclusion of a new agreement with twenty-one (21) other municipalities. The agreement concerns the operation of a technical landfill site and the management of residual materials and replaces the intermunicipal agreement concerning the operation of a regional sanitary landfill site for solid waste in the Coaticook region.

Reusable hygiene products policy

The municipality adopts a financial assistance policy to promote the use of various reusable hygiene products. The new policy looks to encourage the use of these products for both children and adults, with the aim of reducing material going to landfill.

PUBLIC SECURITY

YOUTH FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE POLICY - SPORTS, CULTURAL AND SCIENTIFIC ELITE

- Young people (17 and under) may be eligible for a busary under the Youth Financial Assistance Policy - Sporting, Cultural and Scientific Elite.
- The policy recognizes the participation of a young person in an event or competition that makes them a candidate who excels in a recognized discipline.

LEISURE POLICY - REIMBURSEMENT OF THE SURCHARGE

- The municipality now reimburses 100% of the surcharge paid for recreation registrations, up to a maximum of \$ 150 per child (17 and under) annually.
- All leisure, cultural and sports activities are eligible, except activities already offered in Canton de Hatley.
- All reimbursement requests must reach the municipality before December 31st.

LIBRARY - SUBSCRIPTION REFUNDS

Library membership is eligible for a 100% refund under the recreation policy for youth (17 and under). In addition, the municipality refunds 50% of an adult's library membership, not to exceed \$ 100 per address.

2021 DAY CAMP - REFUND POLICY

The municipality reimburses its residents \$ 30 per child per week for any registration to the 2021 Canton de Hatley day camp. Reimbursement is made by check issued in September. Documents required: official receipt and proof of residence.

DID YOU KNOW?

It is not allowed to stop a road vehicle on a public road where the maximum speed allowed is 70 km/h or more, except in case of necessity or unless a signage authorizes it. - Highway Safety Code, article 384.



In the Canton de Hatley, the majority of rural or collector roads have a speed limit of 70 km/h. We can think of Albert Mines, Beaudette, Dunant, Hatley Center, Rodgers, Sherbrooke and University roads, as examples. Only local streets with a certain residential density have a speed limit of 50 km/h.

A BIT OF HISTORY

MINTON UNITED CHURCH IN THE HEART OF A VILLAGE

Also known as Minton, the heart of Hatley Township was called Maple Hill until 1896, when the township authorities made a request to open a post office there. Great disappointment, it was discovered that there was already a Maple Hill in the Lac Mégantic region. Minton will therefore be the name chosen for this crossroads.

At the turn of the century, at this crossroads, we find the neo-Gothic United Church of Canada built in 1894, an old school, shelters for horses, a creamery and a blacksmith's house that serves as a general store and post office. Other forges and a cheese and butter factory later marked Minton's heyday. From the 1950s, the population decreased, then the village died. Today the church is the only witness to the existence of this once thriving town, but it is only used about once a year and its cemetery has been moved to North Hatley.
